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Dear Colleague:

You are well aware of the mounting concerns regarding avian influenza. At the present time it is our assessment that it is a relatively low risk for humans because there is minimal evidence for person-to-person spread. However, it **warrants our preparedness** because of the potential that the virus could mutate, resulting in rapid spread among humans.

Surveillance

A travel history is vital for febrile patients (>100.4 F), especially those who have returned from Southeast Asia or China within the prior ten days. Please report any suspected infections to our **CD Hotline at 558-5678** (664-6032 after hours and on weekends).

NOTE: We have already met with the hospital infection control professionals, and recommended surveillance of ICU patients with atypical pneumonia or ARDS, and recent foreign travel.

Prophylaxis

Respiratory etiquette and meticulous hand hygiene will provide the most benefit to our community. Alcohol-based hand cleansers are especially effective! A poster is attached for your facility. We do NOT recommend personal stockpiling of oseltamavir (Tamiflu). Such prescribing has already resulted in a shortage, and its effectiveness has not been proven on a community basis. Further, inappropriate use may result in the development of resistant strains.

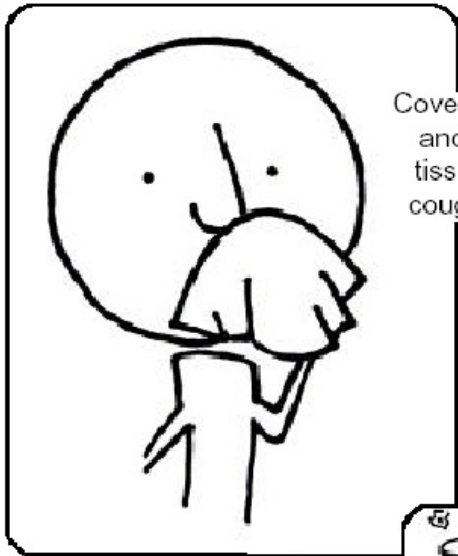
Professional Education

Put your used tissue in the waste basket.

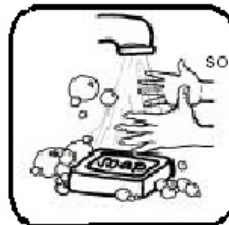


You may be asked to put on a surgical mask to protect others.

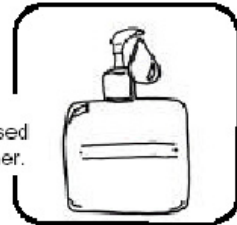
